ACADEMIC INFORMATION

School Counseling

Our comprehensive school counseling program is one that attempts to serve the individual and his/her ever-changing needs. The Career Center and the school counselors' offices are located in the main office. Counselors assist students with problems they may have and provide help and information about personal, educational, and career decisions. Students and parents are encouraged to initiate an appointment for a conference whenever the need arises. Students are not to be excused from class to see counselors without a pass originating from the school counseling office and approved by a signature from their study hall or classroom teacher. Counselors will make themselves available for crisis counseling upon a student, teacher, or parent request.

Advanced Placement Courses

We offer a full complement of AP courses. These courses provide a rigorous curriculum and the opportunity for college credit. VHS received a grant that provides students and teachers additional support and financial incentives for success on the AP exams.

College Entrance Exams

Students interested in college must take a college entrance exam (SAT or ACT). Our school counseling office has extensive information about our SAT preparation program as well as registration information. Registration deadlines are approximately six weeks prior to the test date. More information is available at their websites: ACT (www.act.org), SAT (www.collegeboard.org).

We will offer a PSAT test for student practice and National Merit Scholarship qualification to all 10th and 11th graders on October 14.

Grades

Students receive grades in courses based on a variety of categories (homework, tests, quizzes, classwork, participation, projects, etc). The grading system is as follows:

In addition, VHS offers students an advanced diploma status and a variety of specialty seals and trade certifications for their diplomas. Students who are interested in these additional opportunities should consult their school counselors.

HCPSLink

Parents can monitor student grades, assignments and attendance throughout the year using our online program, HCPSLink at <http://hcpslink.henrico.k12.va.us>.

Homework

The need for homework varies according to the content and level of courses. The amount and frequency of homework is commensurate with the course and class level. Student homework is reviewed, checked, or graded as needed to verify understanding and completion.

Make-up Work

It is the responsibility of the student who had an absence to arrange for make-up work. The time allowed for make-up work is the number of days missed plus one. Note that assigned papers, projects, or other long-term assignments are not considered make-up work.

Report Cards / Interims

Report cards will be distributed to students at the end of each marking period. Final report cards will be mailed home to parents. In addition, interim reports will be distributed to students at the mid-point of each marking period.

Study Habits

Fostering good organizational and study habits in students is a primary focus at VHS. Three ring notebooks should be maintained by students to keep handouts and graded papers in order. Class notes, notes taken while reading assignments, written class work, homework, and other materials should be arranged for easy reference for studying. Student Planners are available for purchase for \$5. The planner allows students to maintain homework and project information.

Technology

All Varina High School students will be issued a personal computer for the school year. Computer care and technology security is clearly defined in the Henrico County Public Schools' Code of Student Conduct. A Help Desk is available in the library before school, after school and during lunch with a pass.

Exams

At the end of each semester, students will be given cumulative exams to determine mastery of course content. Students will take two exams per day with an early release schedule. The exams account for 20% of a student's semester grade.

Senior Academic Incentive Program

All seniors eligible for graduation in June shall take examinations. Seniors eligible for graduation in June may request an exemption from any second semester examination if the following criteria are met:

1. The senior must have a cumulative course average of at least 85 at the end of the third nine weeks.
2. The senior must maintain a minimum fourth nine-week average of 85 in the course to be exempted.
3. The senior cannot have been absent from the class more than five times during the school year (semester class – 3 absences). Religious holidays and school-related absences (field trips, SODA, athletics, etc.) do not count within those absences.
4. Three unexcused tardies to class equals one absence as related to the exam exemption criteria. Six unexcused tardies to school immediately removes the senior from his/her eligibility. Six unexcused tardies to an individual class eliminates the student from exam exemption eligibility in that class.
5. The senior must attend at least 75% of a class in order to be counted present in that class as related to exam exemption eligibility.
6. Any integrity violation that results in disciplinary action removes the student from eligibility.

SOL Sliding Scale Incentive Program

Students enrolled in classes with End-of-Course SOL tests automatically receive a sliding-scale grade based on their SOL score on their final exam.

ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES

Daily Attendance

Daily attendance is taken each morning in the first class of the day. Parents are asked to call the school at 226-8700 to verify a student's absence or late arrival by 9:15 a.m. on the same day.

Absences

Absences will be excused according to one of the following:

1. illness of student or serious illness in family,
2. death of a family member or close friend,
3. appearance in court (student must bring in court summons with him/her),
4. other reasons approved in advance by the school administration.

All other absences will be unexcused. Excessive absences may result in a professional note being required to excuse further absences.

Tardiness to School

The school day begins with the moving bell at 8:35 a.m. If a student is not present at the start of the first period at 8:45 a.m., the student must report to an administrator and sign in. **Oversleeping, running family errands, car trouble, or missing the bus is not considered a valid reason for being tardy.** Unexcused tardies to school will be referred to the school administration and will result in disciplinary consequences.

Class Attendance

All students are expected to arrive to class on time and to be prepared for class. A student is considered tardy if he/she arrives to class after the late bell rings. Excessive unexcused tardies to class will be referred to an administrator for disciplinary action. Students are expected to remain in class for the entire block. Frequent student requests to leave class will be reviewed by the appropriate administrator.

Leaving School without Permission

A student may not leave school for any reason without permission. To do so may result in suspension.

Early Dismissals

A student must bring a signed note from a parent or guardian. The request must state the reason for leaving, the exact time of dismissal, and a phone number where the parent or guardian can be reached for verification. **For your child's safety, no requests for early dismissals will be accepted over the telephone, via fax or email.**

Truancy

After a student has been absent from school 5 days unexcused, the school's attendance officer will contact the parent for an explanation. He will also explain legal consequences for continued unexcused absences. In addition, Varina High School operates a Saturday school for students who are habitually tardy or truant.

HONOR CODE

Teachers will require a written and signed pledge for tests, exams, and other formal assignments. The pledge reads as follows:

VHS Honor Pledge - On my honor, I have neither given nor received help on this assignment.

When it is established that a student has violated the honor code, or the Integrity portion of the county's Code of Student Conduct (cheating, plagiarism, falsification, and/or stealing), the following action will be taken:

First Offense: Student Conference, Parent contact, Zero on work involved (where applicable), Letter on file
Second Offense: 1st offense and 2 days of In-School Suspension (AIP)
Third Offense: Referral to administrative hearing

CODE OF CONDUCT and HCPS POLICIES

A official, comprehensive copy of the Policies and Regulations Manual of Henrico County Public Schools, which includes the Code of Student Conduct, is maintained online.

There are five actions that will result in an automatic recommendation for expulsion: possession of a firearm; assault of a staff member; distribution of drugs or illegal substances; endangerment of the safety of the school community; or habitual offenses of the Code of Student Conduct.

All students attending Varina High School have a right to an education without disruption. In order to ensure this effective learning environment, students are expected to adhere to the following guidelines:

Bus Transportation

Riding the school bus is a privilege. Appropriate behavior is expected of all students on the school bus and at the bus stop for the safety of everyone. Inappropriate behavior will result in disciplinary action and/or suspension of riding privileges.

Class or Campus Disruptions

Inappropriate behavior or any behavior that disrupts classroom instruction is prohibited and is subject to disciplinary action.

Cell Phones

The unauthorized possession or use of any type of electronic or mechanical device that distracts or impedes the educational process is prohibited. All mechanical devices should be "*Off and Away, All Day*" from the time students arrive on campus until 3:45 p.m. Faculty/staff are required to confiscate cell phones that can be heard or seen during the instructional day. Confiscated cell phones will be given to administration for parent retrieval. A first-time violation will result in confiscation and given back to parent/guardian. All electronic devices, including cell phones, require a 24-hour turn-around time to allow for processing in the student database for discipline.

Dress Code

The School Board has an established student dress code. It can be viewed in its entirety in the Code of Student Conduct. Students must dress in a manner that neither distracts from nor substantially disrupts the learning environment.

Students **may not wear** the following items unless otherwise stated:

- Hoods, hats, or head coverings of any kind inside school buildings during regular school hours, unless required for religious or medical reasons.
- Bandanas, do-rags, headscarves, hair picks, wave caps, large combs, brushes, and rollers.
- Sunglasses inside the school building.
- Dresses, skirts, shorts, athletic shorts, and other clothing that are shorter than four inches above the knee even when worn with leggings or tights.
- Messages on clothing, chains, jewelry and personal belongings that pertain to drugs, alcohol, tobacco, sex, gangs, vulgarity or that could reasonably cause a substantial disruption to the learning environment.
- Spiked jewelry, chains, and items that could cause student injury.
- Beachwear, sleepwear, bedrooms slippers.
- Clothing that reveals undergarments.
- Cut-off jeans and cut-off sweat pants or torn, ripped, or slashed clothing that reveals undergarments or body parts excluded by other parts of this code.
- Clothing that is excessively tight or skimpy, including biker pants and clothing with plunging necklines.
- Clothing that is see-through, revealing, or resembles undergarments.
- Tube tops, halter-tops, halter-top dresses, strapless dresses or tops or dresses with spaghetti straps (female tops must be at least two inches wide at the shoulder).

Students may not:

- Drape towels, shirts or shorts around the neck;
- Roll down waistbands on shorts, pants, and skirts;
- Wear clothing in any manner that reveals undergarments at any time;
- Wear athletic basketball jerseys without wearing a t-shirt beneath the jersey;

Students must wear pants on the hips, secured above the buttocks.

Drugs and Alcohol

Possession, use, and/or distribution of alcohol, drugs, or drug paraphernalia on school property during the day or during any school activity is prohibited. Any student who violates this section of the Code of Conduct is subject to school intervention, recommendation for expulsion, and referral to the School Resource Officer.

Fighting

Fighting is strictly prohibited. **Participants will receive 10 days of suspension from school.** Actions that may instigate a fight may result in a 3 day out-of-school suspension. Students who move toward a fight and impede administration are also subject to disciplinary action.

Gambling

Gambling is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to card playing, the use of dice or any activity that involves the exchange of money.

Habitual Offender

Any student that continually violates the Henrico County Public Schools' Code of Student Conduct may be recommended for expulsion.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances. Related to students, it can occur in many forms and can be teacher to student, student to teacher, student to student. It can also be male to female, female to male, male to male, and female to female. The following types of behaviors form a spectrum of possible unwanted sexual harassment: visual (ogling, leering, posters, magazines, gestures); verbal (personal questions, lewd comments, dirty/sexual jokes, whistling, requests for dates); written (love poems, love letters, obscene letters); touching (violating space, patting, rubbing, pinching, caressing, kissing); power (retaliation, using position to request dates or sexual favors); threats (demands, quid pro quo – demand for sexual favors in exchange for a grade, privilege, etc.; and force (rape, assault).

Tobacco

In accordance with Virginia State law, a person under the age of 18 in possession of or smoking cigarettes is violating the Virginia Code of Law 18.2.371.1. All students are PROHIBITED from use and possession of tobacco products, matches, and lighters on school property.

Vandalism

Students are expected to respect the property of others and to take pride in school property. Destruction of any property will result in restitution and/or disciplinary action.

GENERAL INFORMATION**Bookstore**

The PTSA maintains a bookstore for student supplies and spirit gear in L-hall. It is open daily before school and during lunch.

Clinic

The clinic is staffed by a registered nurse. Students must have a pass from a teacher to visit the clinic. In case of injury or illness, a student should report immediately to the teacher in charge and then to the clinic. In an emergency, the student should report to the first adult he/she can find. All medications must be registered with and dispensed by the nurse. Medications should be labeled and given to the nurse as soon as possible.

Deliveries

Deliveries (including food, flowers, balloons, etc.) are not accepted for students. In addition, balloons may not be taken into a classroom or onto a school bus.

Lockers

Students may request a locker for use before school, between classes, during lunch, and after school. Students are required to use lockers for PE classes.

Lost and Found

Lost and found items are kept in the clinic.

Lunch

School Nutrition Services provides a variety of options for student lunches. All students have a student number to use when purchasing lunch. Parents may load their student's account by sending payment to the cafeteria or using www.mylunchmoney.com. Students may eat in any of the three cafeterias at Varina High School. Students must report directly to the cafeteria when dismissed from their class. *Students may not leave campus for lunch.* Students found in unauthorized areas during lunch are subject to search and disciplinary consequences.

Media and Information Center (Library)

The information center is open each day from 7:45 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. All students and faculty must have a borrower's card to check out materials. Books may be checked out for two weeks and may be renewed. Magazines and reference materials may be checked out overnight. A fine of \$.05 per day will be charged for an overdue item.

Parent Contact/Messages

If parents need to provide a message to a student during the school day, they may do so between the hours of 9am and 2pm. Due to traffic in the main office, we are unable to get messages to students before or after that timeframe.

Passes

All students moving on campus during class time **MUST** have a pass. Teachers will follow some general guidelines to assist with safe student movement during the school day. Students should use the class change to use the restroom, visit their locker and move to class. **Students should not be given passes during the first 15 minutes or last 15 minutes of a class unless there is an emergency.** If a student is misusing student passes, appropriate disciplinary consequences may be assigned. Students must secure library passes, administrative passes and counseling passes prior to class time.

Restrooms

Restrooms in L and Q are available for student use all day. During class changes there are additional bathrooms at the end of the buildings, in A-building and in the gym. Students must have a pass for the restroom. Students are encouraged to use the restroom during class changes as student travel is limited during the first 15 and last 15 minutes of class.

School Resource Officer (SRO) / School Security Officer (SSO)

We have two full-time Henrico Police Officers and a trained security officer on campus to assist with the safety and security of students. They are available as resources for parents, students and staff. The SRO is also available to teachers for assistance in instruction or special programming.

Student Supervision Before and After School

Students should not arrive at school before 8:15 a.m. Please arrange to pick up your child promptly from all after-school activities. Students and other spectators will not be allowed to enter and exit after school activities more than once. When students leave an activity, they should be prepared to promptly leave the campus.

Student Parking

Driving to school is a privilege for juniors and seniors. Students must register their vehicles with the school and must display the current year decal. Decals can be purchased for \$10. Vehicles are parked on school property at the student's own risk. Only seniors are allowed to park in the main parking lot on a first-come, first-served basis. Once the main lot is full, seniors may park on the Driver's Ed. lot or the tennis parking lot along with juniors. **Failure to follow these guidelines will result in ticketing, loss of parking privileges and/or towing.** There are no parking facilities for freshmen or sophomores.

Telephones

Any student who needs to use the telephone during the school day can do so with the permission of his/her administrator. Cell phones may not be used between 8:00 a.m. and 3:45 p.m.

Transportation

No changes to transportation may be made for students without written parental notification to school administration prior to 2 pm.

Visitors

All visitors to Varina High School during school hours must report to the Main Office and state the nature of their business. Parents are always welcome to visit the school. Prior arrangements and appointments are appreciated. Visitors' passes must be worn at all times. Visits to classrooms by students from other schools are prohibited.

SCHOOL TRADITIONS**Baccalaureate**

This event is presented each year by the Varina PTSA. Seniors enjoy a motivational and inspirational program presented by fellow students and Varina community members.

Convocation

Friday, September 25, 2009, time TBA. This annual event kicks off the school year for seniors. It features a guest speaker and honors a distinguished VHS alumnus.

Graduation

Graduation is the culminating activity for seniors and is designed to be a solemn and dignified occasion. Student speeches, musical selections, and the awarding of diplomas are highlights of this event.

Homecoming

Junior-Senior Prom

This formal dance is held annually at an area hotel. Prom court and Prom King and Queen are presented at this gala event. Hosted by the junior class, the event honors Varina seniors. The **After-Prom** party is hosted by the Varina PTSA. This activity provides a safe and fun-filled event for students.

Student Recognition Assemblies

Junior and Senior Awards assemblies are held at the end of the academic school year to honor students who have outstanding academic achievement. There are other recognition programs including athletic awards, PTSA awards, 9th graders C-a-movie and Superstars.

SCHOOL PUBLICATIONS**Blue Devil's Advocate**

The student newspaper is designed for our students and is produced by the Center for Communications. Stories are researched and written by students and reflect life at Varina High School.

HONOR SOCIETIES

National Honor Society

The William H. Furgeson Chapter of the National Honor Society is the most prestigious honor society at Varina. Membership is by invitation and induction takes place in the junior or senior year. Specific qualifications for membership are as follows: a grade point average of 3.5 or better, no out-of-school suspensions or more than two AIP assignments in the year previous to the induction, and excellence in character, leadership, and service. All these areas are considered equally and are evaluated by the NHS Selection Committee. Enrollment at Varina High School for a minimum of one semester prior to induction is required. *Cheryl Weening*

National Art Honor Society

Membership in this honor society is determined by performance in upper level art courses. *Dawn Kelly*

National BETA Club

Juniors and seniors are inducted into this national service organization by invitation. Membership criteria include outstanding scholarship, leadership, service, and character. Students must have a 3.0 grade point average to be considered for membership in the BETA Club. A record of service to school and/or community must be demonstrated prior to induction. Also, the general faculty provides input to be evaluated by the BETA Club Selection Committee. *Lesley St. James*

Foreign Language Honor Societies

Mu Alpha Theta

Mu Alpha Theta is a national mathematics honor society; the beginning letters spell M-A-TH. Its purpose is to recognize students who excel in math, and to promote an interest in mathematics. Inductions are held in the spring of each year for rising sophomores, juniors, and seniors. To become a member of Mu Alpha Theta, the following requirements must be met: completed a third year college preparatory math class, juniors or seniors should have at least a 3.5 average in each math course, and sophomores should have earned at least a 4.0 in math classes. *Skip Tyler and Jessica Meade*

This is an honors organization that recognizes students for excellence in journalism. INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETIC PROGRAM

Varina High School is a member of the Virginia High School League (VHSL), the Central Region and the Capital District. The athletic program at Varina High School offers a variety of team and individual sports for both boys and girls.

In order to participate in the athletic program, a student must have a completed "parental consent/physician's certificate form" prior to or on the first day of practice.

To be eligible for participation (including practice) in the sports programs representing Varina High School, a student must be currently enrolled in five subjects and must have passed at least five subjects the preceding semester, be in attendance that particular day for four class periods, and be under the age of 19. As in all activities, permission to participate depends on overall good citizenship on the part of the student.
